Gentlemen: Attention of Mr. Marcel Estiez:

I only got your letter this morning, on my return from the country. I telephoned you at once, and was very glad that your head compositor said that I could have the proofs by the 15th. Time is very much ⁺ the essence of the contract.

Mr. Yorke wrote to me this morning, saying that he did not propose to answer your letter until I had seen you, - which I am hoping to do in the course of this afternoon. This letter is in the nature of a confirmation of a conversation in the future, if you will excuse my being Irish.

The financial situation is roughly as follows. We have been promised some \$10,000.00, which has not yet come in, for various reasons into which it is unnecessary to enter. But we consider that the total amount due you is not due until June 21st, upon completion of the entire contract. In the meantime, by the distribution of the prospectuses and arrangements with booksellers in the great centres, we expect to have the book subscribed ~~to~~ fully within the next couple of months. You will note that even supposing all the books are sold through booksellers at a discount of 33-1/3%, it is only necessary to ob-

tain a sale of between 200 and 250 copies to fill the balance of your account. We have already a hundred or so copies promised from private sources.

The matter of the \$10,000.00 is very confidential, and the point is that we do not wish to ask our other capitalist friends for further contributions unless it should become absolutely necessary, -- a situation which can only arise in case the subscriptions did not reach the figures previously mentioned.

You will also please note that you are yourselves the recipients of all subscriptions and are charged with the distribution. But of course, in the event of all these ^{improbable} impossible misfortunes occurring at the same moment, we should then apply to our other sources for the small amount necessary to balance our account with you.

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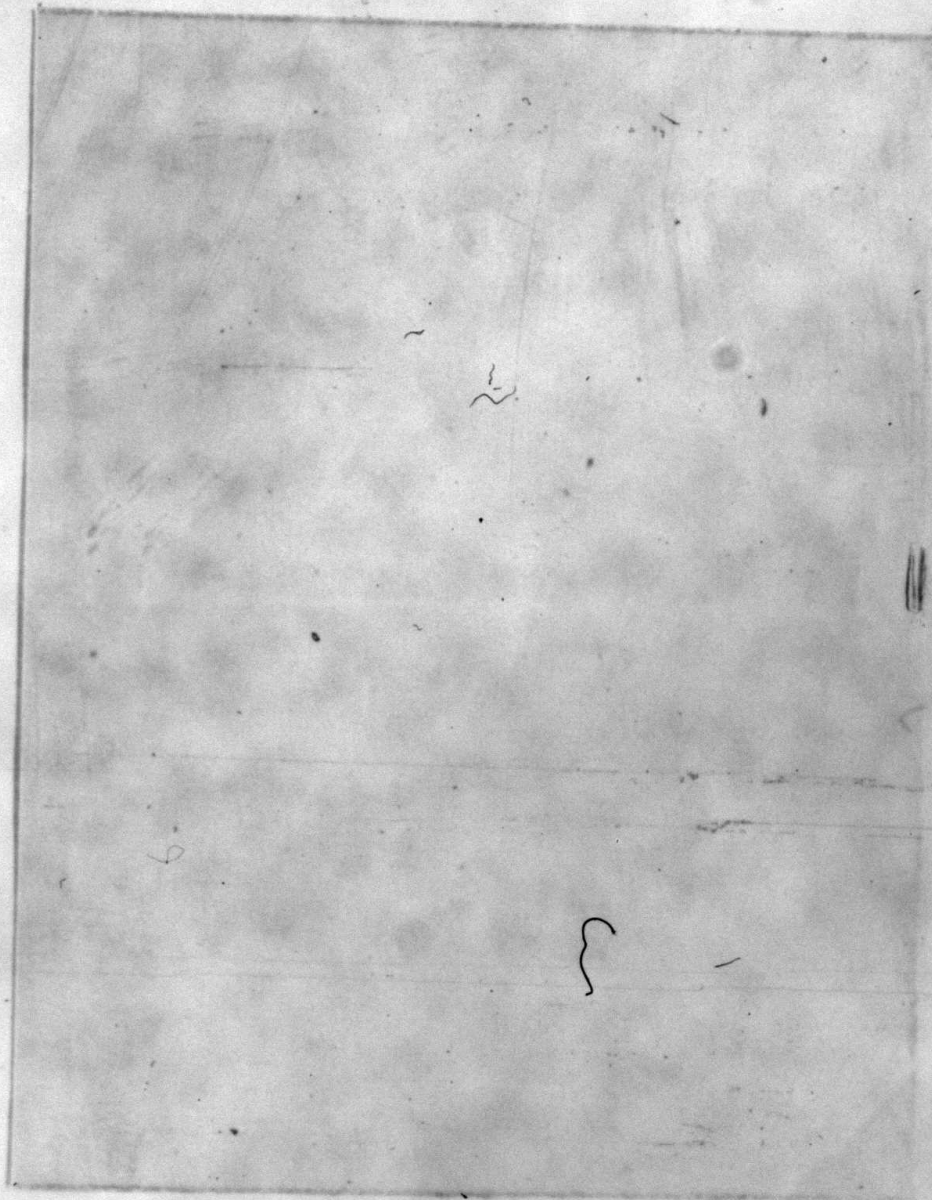

Care Frater:

I had a long conversation with Mr. Holroyd Reece this afternoon. He went away with a copy of the book "Magick" intact as I received it from you. There were no appendices, and either you sent them to us or else you did not. In any case we have not got them.

He is very interested in the whole proposition. When I say the whole proposition, I do not mean merely the question of "Magick", or the Memoirs, or the "Net", but of starting a definite movement towards the "freedom of the artist", which is the absurd way in which he envisages the situation.

He is going to New York on the 26th of February. There he will see Karl Germer and possibly Montgomery Evans. He will then cable me an offer with regard to "Magick."

In the meantime the Serpent having had to go to the hospital this morning to be injected with typhus fever by his favourite doctor, took occasion to call on Smith's and Brentano's on his way home. These people were rather intrigued and will take 200 prospectuses apiece in the firm expectation that they will crave for more.

I wish you would arrange with your family to lose a thousand pounds at Monte Carlo, so that you might under-

stand that on a certain plane there really is something in following an upward curve. (Professionelles'absténir).

I have just had a very informative letter from Smith. It upholds my view that Kasimira was perfectly sincere, honest, and straightforward. My present belief is that she was put off the track by a combination of Hunt and Mrs. Reynolds.

She gave Madame de Miramar the impression that she would turn up here one evening unexpectedly, preferably when you were here, with the idea of raising trouble. I have no data wherefrom to estimate the nature of the conspiracy between K. and Hunt, but I think that our proper course is to put the fear of God into Hunt, and that then they will come running to us.

To return to the subject of this letter, Helroyd Reece has taken away the manuscript which you sent me. This consists only of the book itself. We have no second copy of the appendices. (Incidentally, I have translated the Ritual of the Mark of the Beast into Sanskrit, with, I trust, the happiest of results.) Reece promises to cable me an offer from New York after seeing Germer. I have written to Germer preparing him for the visit. If Germer has any brains at all, he will pull off something big, being a salesman by profession. What is the matter with him is his lack of confidence, of virility. If you wish to put it so, of vulgar optimism. You can call it any names you please, but the fact will remain that this state of mind is the best possible for negotiating business deals. ~~The~~ It obviously needs the control of criticism, but if it is not

there, the deal simply does not go through. You may have a gold mine averaging a thousand ounces to the ton; but unless you can convince some one of the fact, you will not get any capital to work the mine. You have got the idea that you are engaged in a thoroughly conservative business with your brewing machinery, and the rest of it. But you don't realize that the basis of it is the blind faith of the innocent children, whom you exploit, that you will really deliver the brewing machinery that they require on the appointed date. This faith is of course founded upon the experience of the firms with which you have dealt since the beginning that you are willing and able to supply what they want at the price agreed. What you seem to lack is memory. In the history of your firm, there must have been a moment when it was a mere gamble that you should be able to fulfil your contracts. To quote the Book of the Law "Success is your proof."

But then, on the other hand, before you get even the first success, you must have this element of confidence in yourself in feeling that there is a market and that you can supply it.

Here endeth the second lesson.

Yours of the 15th. Thank you for sending me £10 to cover distributing the prospectuses. It is £2 too much. Please take it off the £12 required for the expenses connected with ^{hospital &} pharmacies when you feel like sending that.

Regardie is feeling much better; but he will have to take the greatest possible care of himself for the next two months.

I have myself been feeling pretty rotten, with coughs and colds and chills, and the rheumatism has begun to come back. I am taking good care of myself, and going more or less on a régime.

Bayley wrote me that Hunt had been writing abuse in the American papers. But it appears that it was a false alarm. He was referring to an article which appeared last April by that super-idiot Nigel Trask.

There were twelve of the Seabrook articles, but I had, I think, only ten of them. There are apparently seven missing, not three as you suggest. Incidentally, I understood from the police that they had the articles that Hunt stole from me. It is also pretty certain that he gave them a copy

I don't propose to take any action at present, but I do think the matter may be usefully discussed the next time you and Aumont are with me. Aumont is just the sort of man to pull the strings.

About the publicity, the chess point seems to be that the mud is as thick and black as it can be, and there is no room to put any more. Any change would be a change for the better, and as long as we take no notice we are liable at any moment to have our operations messed up at the most critical point. Whereas if we once hit back successfully, no one will ever try the game on again. Bayley's information having been incorrect, the present is not a good opportunity.

Talking of chess, I am sending you a copy of a game played for the Coupe de Paris. It took seven hours to play over the board. It is very encouraging to see how a game can be pulled out of the fire after such a childish blunder as that on my 11th move.

Yours of the 17th. Thanks for the proofs. But we sent them to you, not for correction, which is our business — it is an art which I strongly recommend you not to learn; as long as there are any sewers to clean, you would be ill-advised to adopt it as a profession — but that you might handle the matter with Simpkin & Marshall. You may, however, as well wait until we have the proofs of the book, not the appendices, complete.

I note what you say about K. I am sending ~~xxxxxxx~~ a letter to Smith which he will hand to Mrs. Reynolds if he thinks it good policy. The situation is certainly mysterious.

I should certainly approach Simpkin Marshall. If Holroyd Reece takes over the book, he simply takes over the standing arrangements, and the further those arrangements have gone, the better we shall be able to bargain.

Frank Harris, who is probably the greatest bargainer that ever lived, once impressed upon me the importance of cash in the hand and the general air of prosperity. It puts one in a stronger position in dealing with any possible customers. As you may be aware, a great number of respectable aged citizens keep expensive mistresses, who are no more use to them than a cautery on a wooden leg, as the French say, simply because it improves their credit on the Bourse, that they ~~may~~^{are} be known to be maintaining an expensive ménage.

Mr. Estiez, the principal of Lecram, called here last night, as I was not well enough to go out. I arranged with him to sign a trait~~e~~ for the approximate balance of his account, payable June 21st. So we have until then to get in that amount for that purpose. Galignani already sent in one order. It is too early to expect anything from the other booksellers or from America. Shakespeare & Co. are taking some prospectuses as soon as the next 1,000 are printed off, and I hope to plant a goodly number on Titus. There are one or two other people, but

I have not been well enough to find them out. I hope to do so in the course of the present week.

Please see Longman. But do explain to them, just as soon as they have eaten up the synopsis with relish, that the book, as written, is not properly speaking a book at all. It is a collection of documents, from which a book can be prepared by some skillful biographer. I am sure that is the proper form for the book to appear in at first.

When that is exhausted will be the time to offer the entire manuscript, as it stands, privately printed at a fabulous figure, advertising that it contains all the suppressed passages. That is good business, and it is also wanted from the point of view of history.

You will not compromise my relations with Reece. On the contrary, if we have got an offer from Longman, it will be ^a right bower.

Thanks for yours of February 21st. I think Gabriel Dee's idea a very good one. I leave the whole matter in your hands.

Neptune seems to be trine to my progressed Venus for some considerable time, and this ought to enable me to put over all sorts of things in the artistic line. Thanks for the translation of the Golden Verses, but what is wanted is a school boy's crib. I have tried to arrange this through Miss Kuntzel.

You should study that chess game more thoroughly. The really interesting point about is the phases in which the game divides itself after the loss of the Queen. Firstly, the question of avoiding exchanges. Secondly, the gaining of the additional piece required for equality. Thirdly, the proper coordination of those pieces. Fourthly the winning of the dangerous pawns on the King's side. Next, the separation of the Queen and King. Finally, the control of the center of the board with a Bishop covering Queen's Rook square. A game of this sort should not be played over once, but studied in detail until every move and sequence of moves is thoroughly understood. To do this will improve your game very conspicuously. The great point is the handling of the pieces in combinations, as in the case of the four bulls and the lion in the fable.

As soon as I am well enough I will take your draft agreement down to Church. It varies so much from the original deed to which I agreed, I am not at all sure of the practical effect of the deed in its present form. For one thing, I can find nothing about the £200, which is wanted for a special pur-

pose of a magical character. Another point is that the difference between £1,000 and £3,000 changes the character of the whole proposition. But after I have seen Church I will let you know.

Thank you for enclosing Smith's letter of February 4th. I have myself received this morning a long screed from him with a copy of a letter to Kasimira. It may be that those dragons will divest themselves of their heads.

I still think Hunt, with some general motive based upon the idea of anything dirty is likely to be profitable to him sooner or later, influenced K. very strongly. In connection with this I ought to mention that Slocombe thinks that the Press Association ought to make an inquiry into Hunt's conduct. I can see no objection to this course. It seems to me that if Hunt gets it in the neck, it will prove to K. that she has been making a fool of herself and urge her to repentance. I am sorry about any complications, but it would be silly to let the matter drop unless we get a couple of thousand pounds from some other source. We don't want to flop at the exact moment of the appearance of the first part of Magick.

We received the appendices of Book 4, Part III. If Reece has not yet left for America - I think he leaves on the 26th - I will rush it round to him tomorrow morning.
