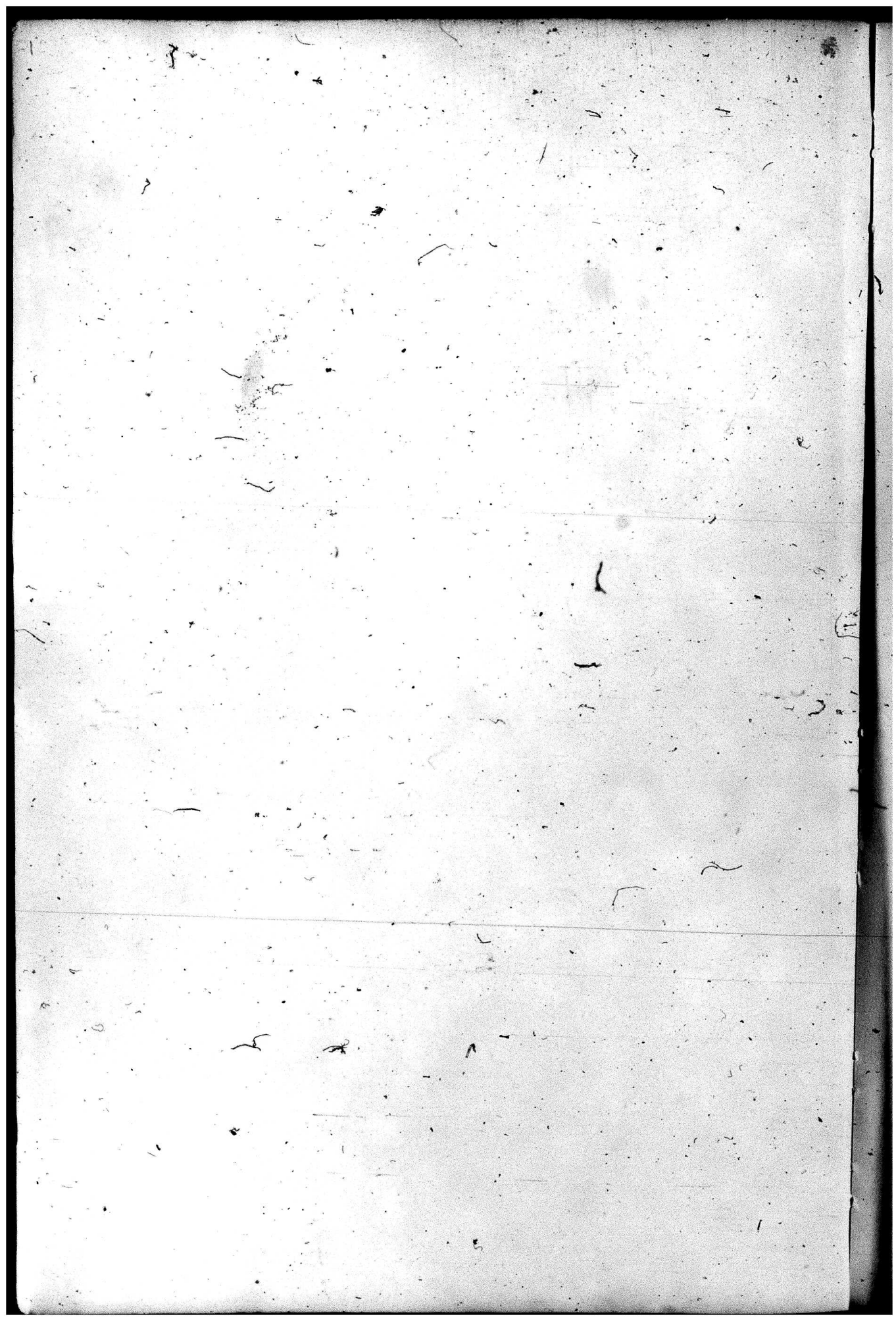

Many thanks for your letter undated, but received two days ago.

I am very happy indeed, that you should take the attitude which you do about military matters; recent events are, in my opinion, exactly what you wanted.

I do not think there is as much difficulty about California as you fear; things may get suddenly very much better, which would not surprise me in the least. I have always been of opinion that the invisible reserves of Germany were at a very low ebb; you remember what Karl said in Berlin 8 years ago, that all the apparent prosperity covered the greatest privation. A thin, however brilliant, skin, A little like the flush of the consumptive; I think today that it is ten times worse for them.

If, on the other hand, conditions do not improve, it may be essential to exploit our friendship in America. I might be very useful over there, and I hope they would have the sense to send me out.

(By the way, you were quite wrong about the sales. Their volume does not depend at all on the conditions of the market). In either event, therefore, there is a good chance of my getting over.

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I am doing anything but stagnate. 
